





Monday Morning

God, your God, is going to raise up a prophet for you. God will raise him up from among your kinsmen, a prophet like me. Listen obediently to him. This is what you asked God, your God, for at Horeb on the day you were all gathered at the mountain and said, "We can't hear any more from God, our God; we can't stand seeing any more fire. We'll die!"

And God said to me, "They're right; they've spoken the truth. I'll raise up for them a prophet like you from their kinsmen. I'll tell him what to say and he will pass on to them everything I command him. And anyone who won't listen to my words spoken by him, I will personally hold responsible.

Deuteronomy 18:15-20

The twin themes of authority and idolatry [in the Deuteronomy reading] together suggest urgent ecclesiological reflection. That is, the issue here is not the nature of the prophet, but the nature of the community to whom the prophet speaks. The nature of the church is that it must host the prophetic-Mosaic word in all its terror.

That word is often a hard one, and so both people and prophet may wish for a lesser, more palatable word. Such a temptation to tone down the word or to distort or to silence the speaker risks the whole glorious enterprise of Israel, and jeopardizes the possibility of a covenantal ethic in the world.


Texts for Preaching, Year B

The gospel must be preached afresh and told in new ways to each generation, since every generation has its own unique questions. The gospel must constantly be forwarded to a new address, because the recipient is repeatedly changing his place of address.

Helmut Thielicke (1908-1986)

German Protestant theologian, rector of the University of Hamburg

A church that doesn't provoke any crises, a gospel that doesn't unsettle, a word of God that doesn't get under anyone's skin, a word of God that doesn't touch the real sin of the society in which it is being proclaimed — what gospel is that?

John Henry Joweti (1864-1923) influential British Protestant preacher

My God, I come to learn at Your feet. You are present here; it is You who drew me to you by Your grace. I listen only to You; I believe only You. Speak; your servant is listening. Lord, I adore You, my heart loves only You; it sighs only for You. I am overwhelmed with joy before You. O eternal majesty! I come to receive everything from You, and to give myself to you completely. Send, O my God, your Holy Spirit. I surrender myself to this Spirit of love and truth. May He enlighten me today to teach me to be gentle and humble of heart. O Jesus! It is You who give me this lesson in gentleness and humility. You teach me to find my soul's rest and peace. Alas! How far I have been from seeking this Peace! I have sought it in the vain imaginations of my pride. Wretched pride, that will never taste the peace of the children of God who are gentle and humble of heart! So be it.

Holiness is God's gift to the Church in Jesus Christ. Through the love of Christ, by the power of the Spirit, God takes away the sin of the world. The holiness of the Church comes from Christ who sets it apart to bear witness to his love, and not from the purity of its doctrine or the righteousness of its actions. Because in Christ the Church is holy, the Church, its members, and those in its ordered ministries strive to lead lives worthy of the Gospel we proclaim. In gratitude for Christ's work of redemption, we rely upon the work of God's Spirit through Scripture and the means of grace to form every believer and every community for this holy living. We confess the persistence of sin in our corporate and individual lives. At the same time, we also confess that we are forgiven by Christ and called again and yet again to strive for the purity, righteousness, and truth revealed to us in Jesus Christ and promised to all people in God's new creation.
