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In 1729, while John Wesley was a student at Oxford, he started a club with his brother Charles. It was soon mockingly dubbed "The Holy Club" by some of his fellow collegians. The club members rigorously self-examined themselves everyday by asking the these 22 questions:



1. Am I consciously or unconsciously creating the impression that I am better than I really am? In other words, am I a hypocrite?

2. Am I honest in all my acts and words, or do I exaggerate?

3. Do I confidentially pass on to others what has been said to me in confidence?

4. Can I be trusted?

- 5. Am I a slave to dress, friends, work or habits?
- 6. Am I self-conscious, self-pitying, or self-justifying?
- 7. Did the Bible live in me today?
- 8. Do I give the Bible time to speak to me every day?
- 9. Am I enjoying prayer?
- 10. When did I last speak to someone else of my faith?
- 11. Do I pray about the money I spend?
- 12. Do I get to bed on time and get up on time?
- 13. Do I disobey God in anything?

14. Do I insist upon doing something about which my conscience is uneasy?

- 15. Am I defeated in any part of my life?
- 16. Am I jealous, impure, critical, irritable, touchy or distrustful?
- 17. How do I spend my spare time?
- 18. Am I proud?

19. Do I thank God that I am not as other people, especially as the Pharisees who despised the publican?

20. Is there anyone whom I fear, dislike, disown, criticize, hold a resentment toward or disregard? If so, what am I doing about it?

- 21. Do I grumble or complain constantly?
- 22. Is Christ real to me?

Monday Morning


At that time the Festival of the Dedication took place in Jerusalem. It was winter, and Jesus was walking in the temple, in the portico of Solomon. So the Jews gathered around him and said to him, "How long will you keep us in suspense? If you are the Messiah, tell us plainly." Jesus answered, "I have told you, and you do not believe. The works that I do in my Father's name testify to me, but you do not believe because you do not belong to my sheep. My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand. My Father, in regard to what he has given me, is greater than all, and no one can snatch them out of the Father's hand. The Father and I are one."

I told you, but you don't believe. Everything I have done has been authorized by my Father, actions that speak louder than words. You don't believe because you're not my sheep. My sheep recognize my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them real and eternal life. They are protected from the Destroyer for good. No one can steal them from out of my hand. The Father who put them under my care is so much greater than the Destroyer and Thief. No one could ever get them away from him. I and the Father are one heart and mind.

Late have I loved you, O Beauty ever ancient, ever new, Late have I loved you! You were within me, but I was outside, and it was there that I searched for you. Old Sarum Primer

Lord, quench the thirst not only of those who come to you. Whenever anyone seeks you may he freely be admitted to the presence of the Savior. The grace of the feast is not restricted to one occasion. Its rays of glory never set. It is always at hand to enlighten the mind of those who desire it. Its power is always there for those whose minds have been enlightened and who meditate day and night on the holy Scriptures, like the one who is called blessed in the holy psalm: Blessed is the man who has not followed the counsel of the wicked, or stood where sinners stand, or sat in the seat of the scornful, but whose delight is in the law of the Lord, and who meditates on his law day and night.

In meditative prayer the Bible ceases to be a quotation dictionary and becomes instead "wonderful words of life" that lead us to the Word of Life. It differs even from the study of Scripture. Whereas the study of Scripture centers on [study], the meditation upon Scripture centers on internalizing and personalizing the passage. The written Word becomes a living word addressed to us.

This is a time not for technical studies or analysis or even the gathering of material to share with others. We are to set aside all tendencies toward arrogance and with humble hearts receive the word addressed to us. Often I find kneeling especially appropriate for this particular time.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer says, "Just as you do not analyze the words of someone you love, but accept them as they are said to you, accept the Word of Scripture and ponder it in your heart, as Mary did. That is all. That is meditation." When Bonhoeffer founded the seminary at Finkenwalde, everyone there practiced a daily halfhour silent meditation upon Scripture. Prayer is not to be made to God as if he were absent. He is here, present in us, and we in him, by the spirit.

When good things can also be recognized as bad things, then you have the spiritual gift of

discernment. This will also allow you to see that many things which are good for you are also bad things for other people, the animals, or the earth. It forces you beyond "either/or" thinking toward "both/and," or non-dual, thinking.

Once you have learned to discern the disguised nature of evil, you will be able to recognize that both perfection and imperfection are everywhere—everything is broken and fallen: weak and poor, you and me, your marriage, your children, and, yes, America and the Church, too. "Why do you call me good?" Jesus says. "God alone is good!" (Mark 10:18). If Jesus can say this about himself, then we can surely say it concerning just about everything. He might have given you the greatest recipe for happiness for the rest of your life in that statement. Now you can start accepting things in their broken, faulty state. You will not be so constantly disappointed, and think people have let you down because they are not perfect. Nor do you have to wait for things to be perfect to fall in love with them.

Richard Rohr, from Spiral of Violence

Discernment is more like sifting or panning for gold. We slowly sort through all the junk and false answers to discover God's answer at the center—the nugget of gold in the midst of worthless pebbles. Discernment requires faith, prayer, and patience. It calls individuals and groups to sit and wait for God's answer, even if it takes months to discern.

Discernment is not a quick process, and its slowness can frustrate those for whom haste is a constant imperative. God can take a while to provide an answer. It can take us a long time to sift through all the noise of the world and finally hear God's whisper. It requires letting go of not only the voices of convention, security, and stability, but also the voices of pride and fear that can scream out from within all of us.
